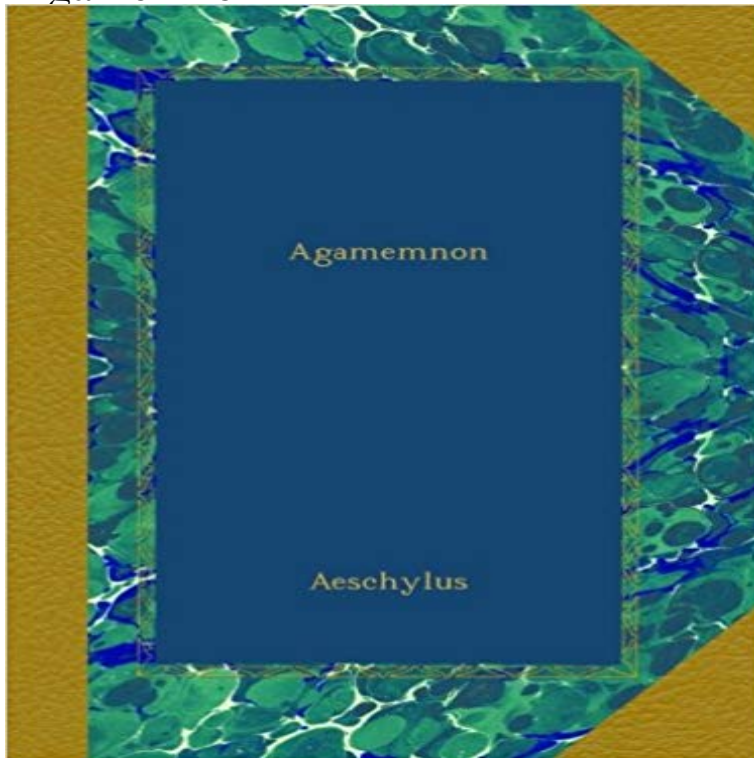


# Agamemnon
